Performing: We had a full calendar of 17 performances in 2023, not just in the summer. That was 1 more than last year. We had gigs from January until December. An all women's group performed at the CEIU National Womens Conference. We had out of town gigs at Saltspring Island for the Blossom Festival, Cumberland 125th Anniversary Celebration, Port Hardy for FILOMI Days (Fishing Logging and Mining) and the Malahat Skywalk. In addition we played the Langford Canada Day event, the Royal BC Museum for the reopening of the Old Town exhibit, the Hiroshima Nagasaki Remembrance event and the Vancouver Island Dragon Boat races. As usual we had Mochi Tsuki Kai, Japanfest and the Cultural Fair for the VNCS, Gyro Park Music in the park and Autumn Lantern Festival for Saanich Parks and Rec. We also did 2 days at Greekfest this year. By October we were thought we were done for the year but we had another request from the museum for their Winterfest event in December. So we donned our extra layers and our Santa hats and braved the cold to play on a tiny stage. That was a very full calendar, sometimes exhausting and mostly rewarding.



Sharing Taiko with the Community: Our mission is to share taiko. This year we brought taiko to some communities that we hadn't visited before – Cumberland, Saltspring Island, Langford and the Canadian Employment and Immigration Union Women. As well, we had some community groups that are regular bookings and we even have one, the Hiroshima/Nagasaki remembrance, that has booked us 4 years in advance in order to guarantee that we won't be already booked.
